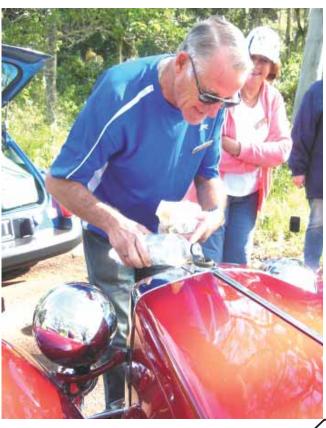
John had told us that it would be a lovely drive and he was right.

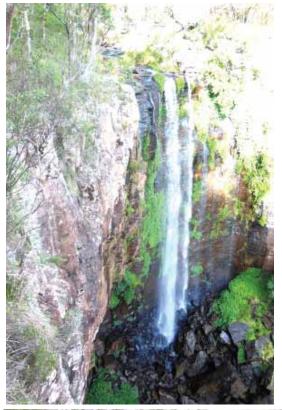
We went through open farmland then crossed several rocky creeks and into stunning rain forest. The road sign said 'steep and winding' which really was an understatement!!!!

Our thanks must go to John for his tireless work to make this weekend the success it was.

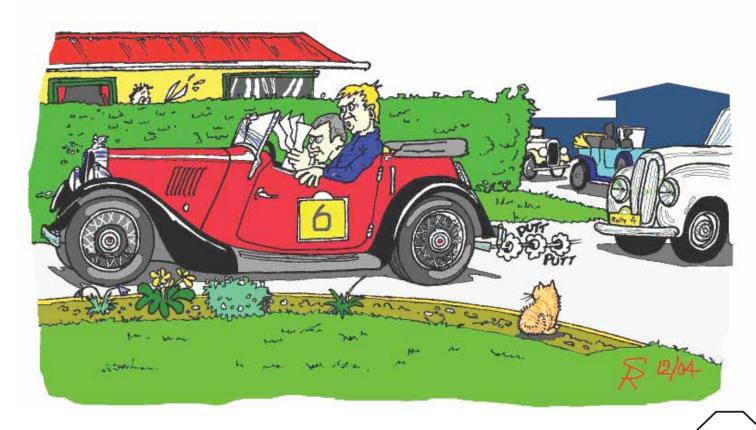
Brass Monkey Weekend Away - Day 3

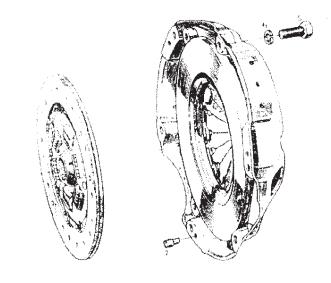

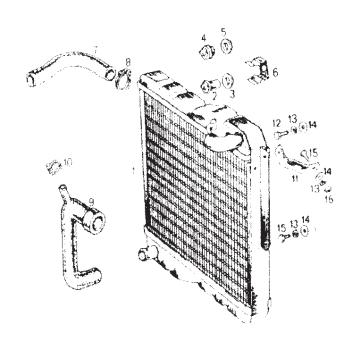

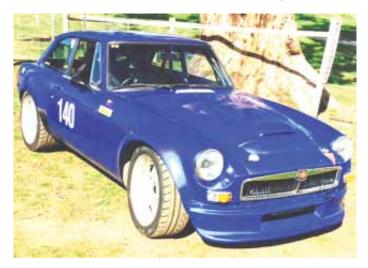

TD breaks Records at Bonneville!

Goldie Gardner made many attempt on many records on the Bonneville Salt Flats in Utah in EX 135 in 1951. After 16 records were broken and while a different supercharged 1250cc XPAG engine was being prepared for EX 135, an interesting event occurred.

According to John Thornley in his book, Maintaining the Breed.

Among the American journalists who had been assigned to cover the Gardner record attempts was Dick van Osten, associate editor of Motor Trend. He arranged with the American Automobile Association at Wendover to attempt to establish American Class F stock car records in the open car division, using an MGTD Mark II. The expression 'stock car' in this context means that the records will be attempted with a car selected by the AAA from an AAA dealer's stock and then simply run-in, under AAA's supervision, prior to crossing the start line.

The car was drawn from the showroom of the Foreign Motor Car Company of Salt Lake City and run in for 1,000 miles. Van Osten collected as crew one of the Motor Trend publishers, Pete Petersen and circulated the ten-mile circular course for twelve hours, stopping only to refuel and change of driver. In a most astonishingly consistent run, they established 23 stock car records and broke 5 existing national ones. An indication of the consistency with which the car ran is given by the fact that, though the records varied in distance from 25 kilometres to twelve hours, the speeds recorded varied only between 74.62 and 75.36 mph, reflecting the greatest possible credit on all concerned'.

There is a grainy movie record of this feat.
