We only had 25 minutes before we got back on our coach so retired to the nearest pub for a quick drink together.


OBITUARY -HAYNES, DEREK GORDON,

MG IS GETTING BACK TO ITS BRITISH ROOTS. FROM THE MX5 CLUB FACEBOOK PAGE

Once known for light-weight, low-gravity sports cars, the nearly 100-year old British brand was recently sold to Chinese automotive giant SAIC and has been selling softer family-oriented vehicles since.

While the brand is currently focused on selling SUVs and its MG 3 hatch and MG 6 sedan, its head of design Shao Jingfeng said perception would quickly change.

The now rapidly evolving and expanding car maker has billions to spare and a desire to add traditional sports cars back into MG's line-up.

Speaking to Drive at parent-company SAIC's headquarters in Shanghai, Jingfeng confirmed MG would bring back a small lightweight roadster to rival the MX-5 - but not quite as we know it.

"Yes, yes we will [build an MX-5 rival]," he said. "This is MG B and MG A type car."

Jingfeng also confirmed it would be an EV roadster and unlike its Japanese rival (above) and the MG B, the revival will be all-wheel drive.

"Yeah, [it is like an EV roadster], new platform, totally new sports car, all-wheel drive.' Jinfeng, who previously worked as a designer at Volkswagen for 13 years, added that we can expect even more sports cars to come from the reinvigorated brand.

"And also a motorsports car, a sports car and two years later EV, all EV," he said. "I will make MG brand closer to history, because the brand stopped for several years and for customers [building SUVs] doesn't answer, 'who is MG?' So we need to get back to the beginning."

Jinfeng couldn't confirm an exact timeline or availability but it is likely that the new roadster will be made in right-hand drive and be on the cards for Australia.

A spokesperson for the company later added that MG was stuck between producing its range of new SUVs and investing in rebuilding its sports car heritage that SAIC bought when it purchased the company.

"Sports cars are the essence of MG in the past and we're trying to carry over this essence into our future plans," they told Drive.

"This is something people remember in the past but when you look into the auto industry you see a significant switch to SUVs.

"In the meanwhile, we need to look into the future trend and make sure that people are starting to see the future but keeping the heritage of the brand."

MG to compete with the MX5

CONFIRMED: MG IS BUILDING A NEW ROADSTER

MG has begun work on a new two-seater sports car to succeed the MG TF and it will arrive before the end of the decade. A spiritual successor to the MG TF, the two-seat sports car will enter production soon, an inside source has confirmed. And although there's no official launch date it should be on sale well before the end of this decade.

Speaking exclusively to Auto Express, an MG insider confirmed bosses have been discussing a return to the open-top sports car market and want to make it happen just as soon as the British brand has re-established itself under SAIC ownership. As a result an exact timeframe has not yet been agreed. However MG recently revealed it's working on two new vehicle architectures, one of which will be designed to support a compact roadster, according to our source.

Both these platforms are being designed to accommodate similar levels of flexibility as with the VW Group's MQB layout, with the ability to accommodate large



numbers of components and engines to help slim down costs. And it's believed the twin architectures will see four new MG models launched across different markets by 2020.





Monday morning saw a trip to Texas, again with a very substantial morning tea provided by the Local Schools'









Jim and Moya Haines and Joe and Jan Evans arrived at Jimboomba to have lunch after attending appointments.







HISTORY OF MG - PART 7 -BEFORE THE WAR

The MG supercharged 6 cylinder racers dominated and won all events in the early 1930s. The race organisers decided to make the game fairer as betting was losing popularity with the obvious winners being MG. Superchargers were banned in 1934. The K3 was too heavy and slow without the blower. Management at MG looked at the new N type OHC 6 cylinder model and it doesn't have the old ladder chassis. The rear wheels sat out wider so 7 NA chassis were taken off the production line and made into factory racers. These MGs won the major racers and the organisers did not remove MG dominance!

Two NEs 0516 and 0520 were imported into Australia by John Sherwood. They were raced by John Sherwood (right) and John Barraclough. They continued racing post war & later fitted superchargers when the ban was removed.

I became involved helping Lance Dixon who added NA 0520 to his large collection of pre war racers. I worked on originality on his cars but he did not fit a blower as his wife Yvonne drove the MG as Lance handled the Alfas. The vendor had fitted a racing Holden engine with an MGTC gearbox. He said he drove the car up to Sydney regularly and needed an engine local garages could work on. Lance obtained a factory MG engine and a correct gearbox. The blueprinted Holden engine was sold to Warragul and I fitted the gearbox to TC9525. It is still perfect today and runs in my 1949 Clipper Blue MGTC.

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


