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

Life Member Murray Arundell in July sought members expressions of interest in a run to Gympie with participants taking a ride on the Mary Valley Ratter – this being the 1st Anniversary of the run.



Being a Long Weekend half of the 19 members attending, drove their MGs up from the Gold Coast or Brisbane on the Friday evening to avoid the Bruce Highway bottleneck. Yours truly, decided to take a risk and departed the Gold Coast early on Saturday in my MG Y Tourer up the M1, across the Gateway bridge and along the Bruce Highway, all at between 85 and 90kph. I had no problems and could have done a bit higher speed but didn't want to push the engine as it has less than 500km on it. A number of passing vehicles took photos of the Y as they passed.

My problem was keeping the engine within a suitable rev. range. The engine has a roller cam and lifters so has a few extra HP than a standard XPAG engine.


like us are working diligently as great servants of MG to maintain its history.

AUSTRALIAN HISTORIC VEHICLE INTEREST GROUP

Dear Fellow Historic Vehicle Enthusiast,

We need the Australian Federal Government to Remove the Luxury Car Tax (LCT) on Historic Cars. Australians take immense pride in our heritage buildings, historical artefacts, famous artworks and other items of cultural significance. Our motoring heritage is just as important. Because of their significance, many examples of our early motoring history have become valuable, sought-after and have, in many cases, left the country. The LCT has proven to be a major barrier for many of these vehicles ever returning to Australia.

The LCT was introduced in 2000 as part of a sweeping reform of the taxation system and replaced the previous Wholesale Sales Tax (WST) and was intended to continue the degree of protection to the local car manufacturing industry. The WST, however, was never intended to apply to the importation of historic vehicles.

Historic motor vehicles often offer little in the way of creature comforts and can prove challenging to drive. These vehicles are, for the most part, anything but luxurious and have never presented a competitive threat to the local motor manufacturing industry

The LCT is having a negative impact on the importation, or re-importation, of many historic cars. Not only that, but historic cars currently contribute very little to LCT revenue (less than ¼ of 1% of all LCT collected). It is proving to be a one-way valve to our unique motoring heritage and is a major blow to Australia's vibrant Historic Vehicle Movement. Not only does it affect the enjoyment of our hobby, it limits the provision of opportunities for our historic vehicle repairers, allied trades and suppliers.

As like-minded individuals who pursue their love of historic motoring, we should not have to suffer this punitive tax. It no longer serves the purpose for which it was intended and generates little in government revenue. The removal of LCT on historic cars is also supported by the Australian Historic Motoring Federation Inc. For further information please see our Facebook page.

We are asking for your support in removing the LCT on historic cars 30 years of age and older by signing this on-line petition. The petition will be used by AHVIG to encourage immediate bi-partisan political action to address this issue. Thank you for efforts in supporting this.

DON'T BE CAUGHT WITH YOUR HEAD IN THE SAND - READ THIS. IT MIGHT AVOID A NASTY ACCIDENT.

Now that your attention is focused, answer this Question. When did you last check your wheels for loose/broken spokes?

Wheel spokes are made from heat treated steel, with a head on one end - and a thread, on the other. They become brittle, in time. The heads pop off. Also, sudden change in temperature can make them break, i.e. a frosty climate issue (when your car is left out in the frost, at a Motel over night!)

A sharp road impact will break a head from a spoke. How should you check all your wheels, including the spare?

It's simple - look at each spoke carefully. Don't get spooked with the number of spokes to examine. Take a plastic handled screwdriver, and tap, tap each spoke. The paint will be O.K. Like the strings on a musical instrument, the strings under tension "twang!" Each spoke will have a sharp sound when they are tensioned properly, too. If one sounds dull, it will be un-tensioned, or broken. Trouble. GET THE WHEEL FIXED!

And while on the subject of wheels, "are your tyres out of date?" Get them all checked! Old tyres tend to remain fitted to our cars. And forgotten. Tyres have a

and then into the Park for lunch. This route is one of the prettiest MG drives that you can do with lots of winding, scenic roads.


Lunch was excellent and great value at \$15 per person.






HISTORY OF MG-PART 15 - PRE WAR

We celebrate 90 years of the M-Type Midget which is 90 years since the first MG Midgets left the Morris Garages assembly lines to establish a small British sports car that over the next few years came to dominate their section of the market. It was fortuitous that just at a time when the MG marque was developing that William Morris should decide to build a car to challenge the Austin Seven at the lower end of the market. With the acquisition in 1927 of the bankrupt Wolseley Motors by Morris gave him access to the talent and capacity to design and build a small OHC power unit, to drive entry to produce a much needed entry model for the Morris range.

The simple chassis for the Morris Minor had half-elliptic springs all round, a 78-inch wheelbase and a 42-inch track. The four-cylinder engine had a stroke of 847mm, giving a capacity of 847cc, 100cc greater than the current Austin Seven. The government rating was 8hp, resulting in an annual tax of 8 pounds. The car appeared at the 1928 Motor Show in two forms, a fabric covered, two door plus a four-seater saloon in lightweight construction and a four seater The saloon cost 135 pounds and the open car 125 pounds. No engine was installed but reaction was positive. A smaller version of the MG radiator designed for the 18/80 headed the fabric covered, two-seater. The









Midget attracted a lot of attention at Olympia. This car was used for the first sales brochure although it differed in some respects from production cars.

By 1930 several changes were introduced and metal bodies were introduced and Bowden cables operated from a cross-shaft with the handbrake. This gave four-wheel braking on the handbrake and remained in use on all the MG models up to the introduction of hydraulic brakes for the T-series in 1936.

The boat-tailed two-seater sports was initially offered as a Fabric body but was a metal panelled body version later. The MG sold well with 3235 built and production exceeded all previous models.





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
